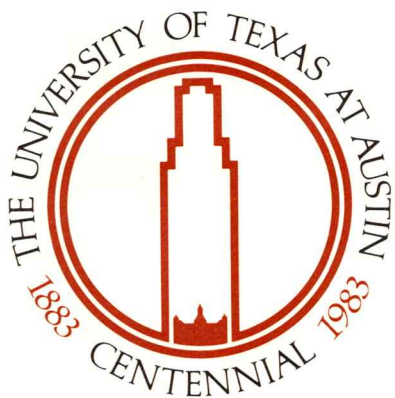

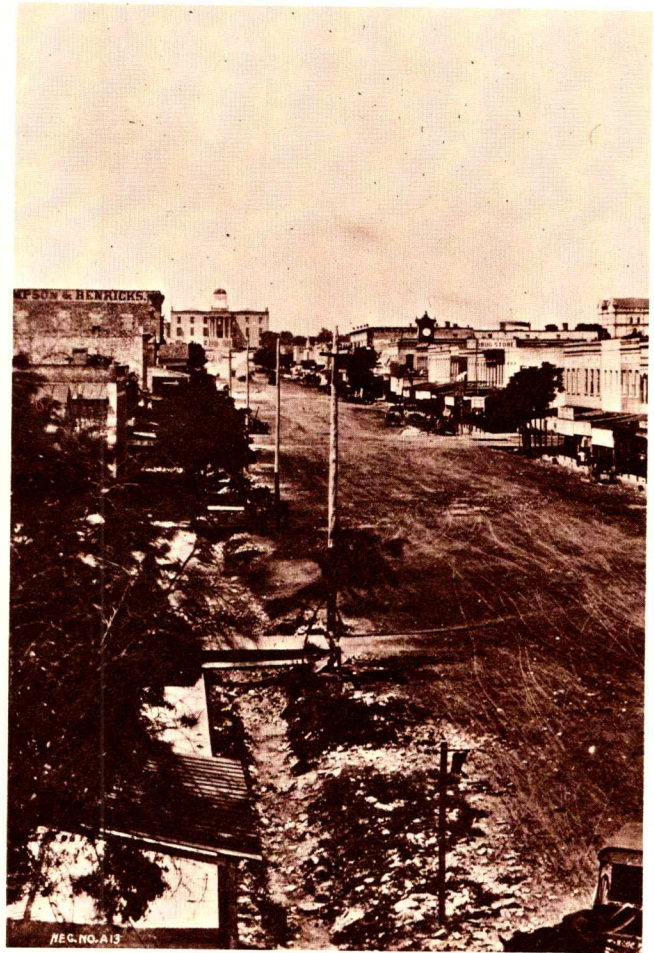
The Temporary Capitol, 1883.

After the original Capitol was destroyed by fire, a Temporary Capitol was hastily built for use while the new Capitol was under construction. University classes were held in this temporary structure from September to December 1883.

"Sounds penetrated through the thin plank partitions to such a degree as to disturb lectures or recitations. Between my (class) room and its neighbor there were knotholes through which I have known communications between students to pass during lectures.

The Capitol was destroyed by fire in November 1881, and replaced by the present Capitol.

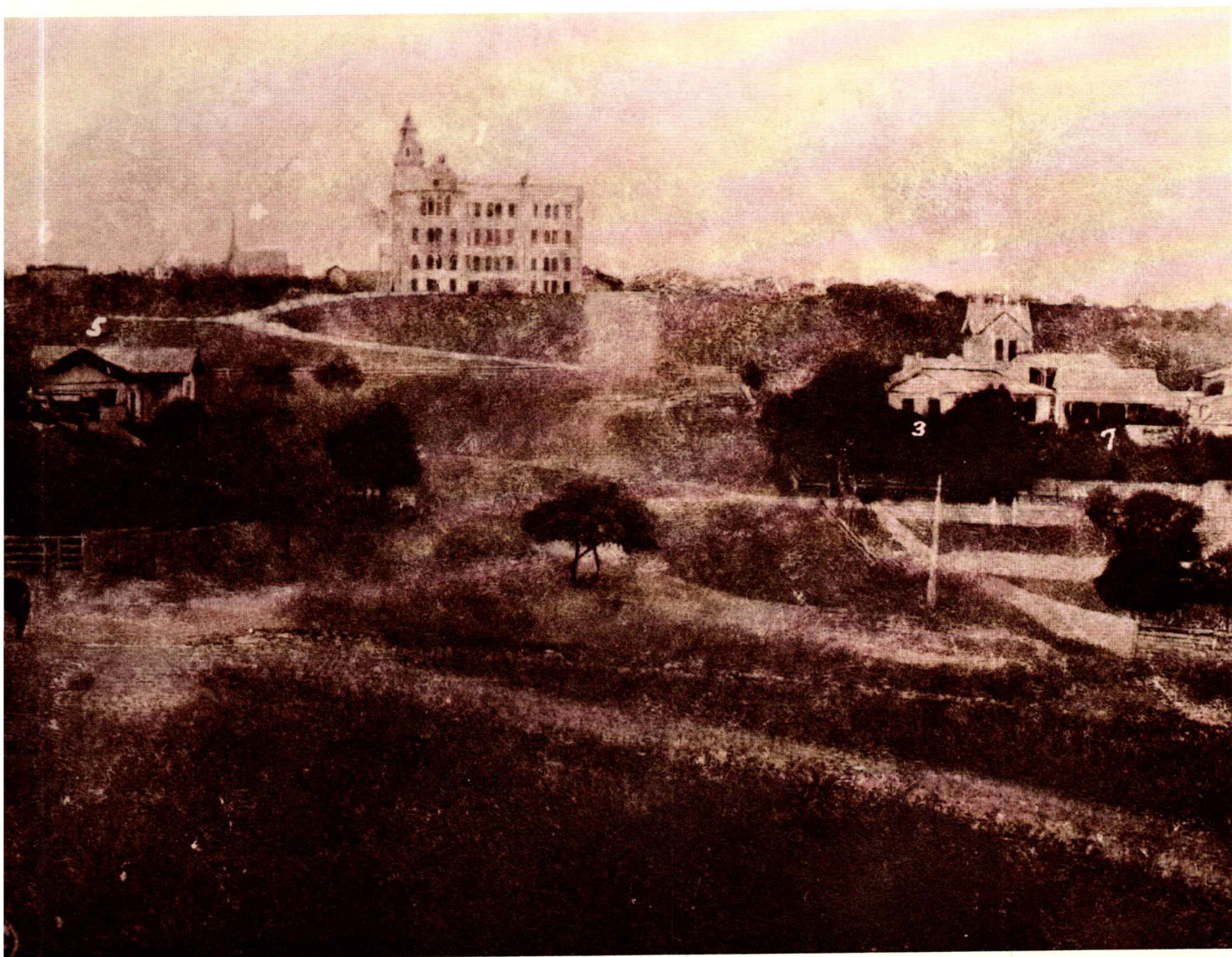

This early photograph was taken from Nineteenth Street and University Avenue. Inaugural ceremonies marking the official opening of The University of Texas were held in the unfinished west wing on September 15, 1883.

"The elevated locality whereon the main University stands, embracing forty acres of land, selected when the city of Austin was surveyed for the State capital, was for many years called 'College Hill.'"

"From the earliest times, it has been the cherished design of the people of the Republic and of the State of Texas, that there shall be established . . . an Institution of learning, for the instruction of the youths of the land in the higher branches of learning, and in the liberal arts and sciences, and to be so endowed, supported and maintained, as to place within the reach of our people, whether rich or poor, the opportunity of . . . a thorough education."

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS
FEBRUARY 11, 1858

Although the establishment of The University of Texas was indeed "the cherished design" of the Seventh Texas Legislature in 1858, the intervention of the Civil War and Reconstruction delayed the creation of The University until March 30, 1881, when Governor Oran M. Roberts signed into law a bill passed by the Senators and Representatives of Texas' Seventeenth Legislature.

In September of 1881, a vote of the people of Texas located the Main University in Austin and the Medical Branch in Galveston.

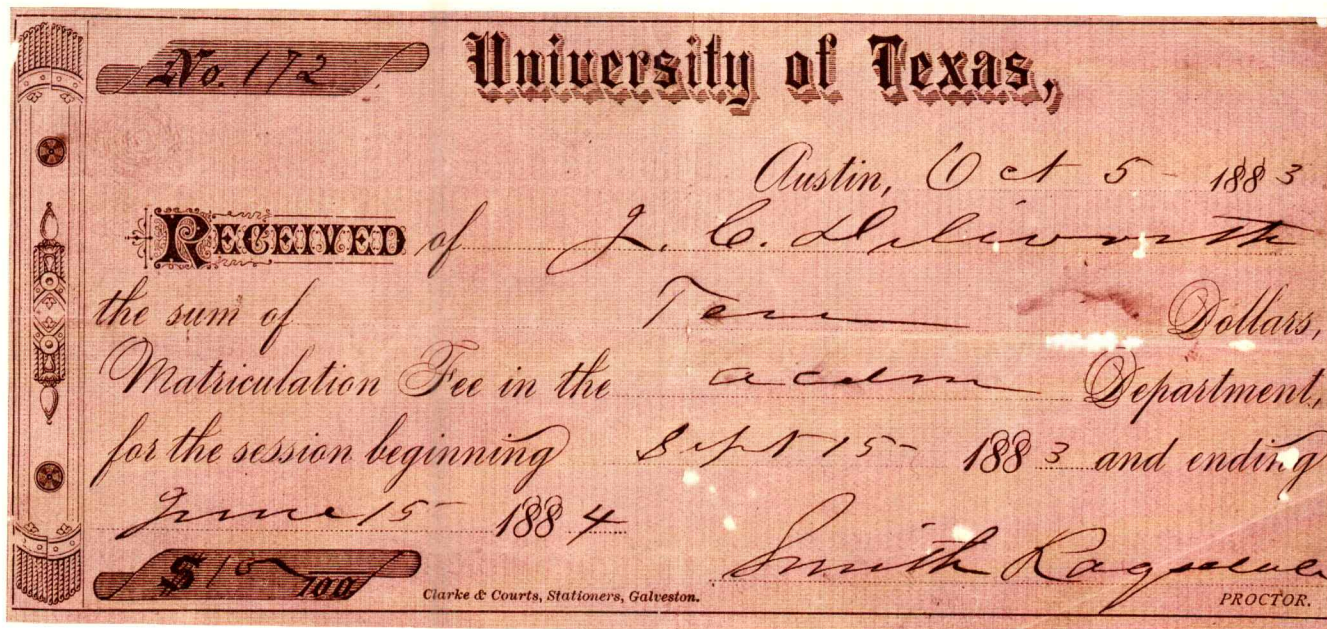
Two years later, on September 15, 1883, The University of Texas held opening ceremonies in the unfinished west wing of the original Main Building. A crowd of about 200 attended the morning program and heard stirring addresses by Dr. Ashbel Smith, first President of the Board of Regents, Professor John William Mallet, Chairman of the Faculty, The Honorable John Ireland, Seventeenth Governor of The State of Texas, former Governor Oran M. Roberts, and other dignitaries.

In an "elegant address . . . frequently interrupted with applause," Dr. Smith noted the potential im-

portance of the newly-formed university for Texas and its neighboring territories. "Now, all these surrounding populations . . . are beginning to look to Texas, . . . to this university they will look for their most thorough, comprehensive, practical education of the first class. Fellow citizens, for this vast region which I have averted to, the City of Austin, the University of Texas, will be the home of knowledge and of intellectual training. Our responsibility and our duty lie broad and great before us."

When The University opened for classes, just over 100 students had registered. Students continued to matriculate throughout the fall, and enrollment reached 221 by the semester's end. Of the 221 students, 163 were men and 58 were women; 169 enrolled in the general Academic Department and 52 in the Law Department. Until the Main Building was readied in January of 1884, classes were held in the Temporary Capitol at Eleventh Street and Congress Avenue. In The University's first year of operation, a faculty of eight and one proctor conducted the affairs of the institution. At the year's end, 13 law students received degrees during the first commencement ceremonies held on June 14, 1884, at Millett's Opera House.

Almost three decades later, Dr. John William Mallet, then a professor at the University of Virginia, reflected on the rigors of opening the new university and the challenges confronted by those who were present during the historic first year of 1883. "Among the most vivid impressions that remain to me of those days is that of the Texas spirit that seemed to say—'Yes, it is not very clear how the thing is to be done, but the State of Texas has said that it shall be done, and it *will* be done, somehow.'"

Professor's Report of the First Spanish Class, October 1883.

"The great majority of the first body of students turned out to be worthy and excellent material. Two impressions in regard to them remain clearly in my mind.

... These young Texans were characterized by great lack of formal school training . . . combined with a certain quite notable maturity of mind derived from early contact with and participation in the activities of adult life. Boys whose spelling and arithmetic were much behind their years talked and thought like grown men of house building out on the prairie, of cattle driving, even of social and political movements.

Secondly, I was struck with the immense value to a people of a State history, and a State pride in that history as influencing even the very young."

THE ALCALDE

Matriculation Receipt, October 5, 1883.

J. C. Dilworth enrolled in the Academic Department during The University's first session and paid a matriculation fee of \$10.00. He was the 172nd student to register for classes.

"Dear Father, . . . Everything is very high here; a great deal higher than in Nashville (at Vanderbilt). My board will cost me about \$22½ a month, and my washing will cost me \$3.50. When you send me my board money send me enough to get me a pair of boots and overshoes as the ones that I have are worn out. . . Your Son."

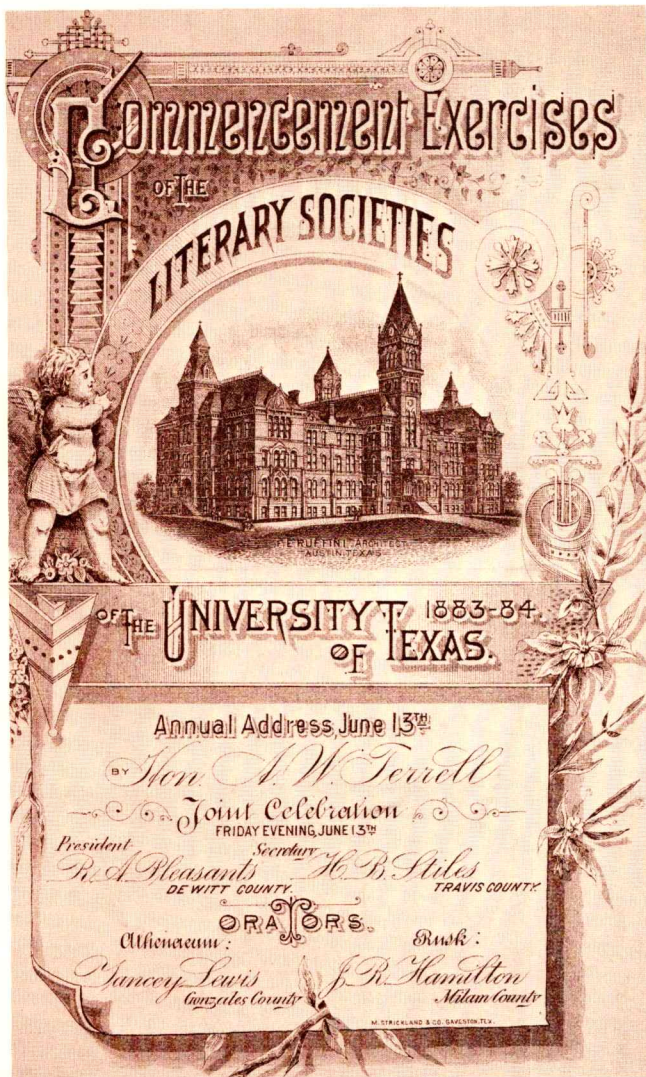
The First Faculty of The University of Texas, 1883–1884.

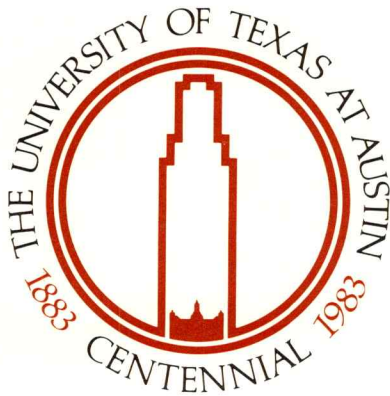

"Sec(tion) 10 The Legislature shall, as soon as practicable, establish, organize and provide for the maintenance, support and direction of a university of the first class, to be located by a vote of the people of this State, and styled 'The University of Texas,' for the promotion of literature, and the arts and sciences. . . ."

THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, 1876

"Here are the words of the constitution; they are clear in meaning and explicit; they are mandatory; they command the legislature; they express the will of the people of Texas; they give no countenance to the conceits of individuals who presume to be wiser than the people, and to set aside their sovereign will in favor of their own plans of public education. The people of Texas in the constitution ordain the establishment of a university of the first class as solemnly as they ordain the establishment of courts of justice, of common schools and other institutions of society. There is no open question of policy; the constitution has decided this matter."
